


ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ETHOLOGICAL SOCIETY

Registration

Welcome to the Annual Meeting of the *Ethologische Gesellschaft e.V.* in Tutzing. Our conference venue is the *Evangelische Akademie Tutzing* (Ev. Akademie) in Tutzing. You will be provided with a printed version of the program at registration. If you have booked your accommodation at the Akademie, you can do your conference registration together with your checkin to get your room keys. In the evenings, we will gather at the bar and the cosy salons of the *Akademie*. Please note that the bar accepts only cash (ATMs can be found in the vicinity, see Map).

Accommodation

Those who have booked an accommodation with us, will be housed at the *Evangelische Akademie Tutzing*. You will get your keys at the registration desk. Please note that it is a non-smoking facility. Smoking is not allowed in any of the rooms, but there are designated outside smoking areas (see *Venue Map*).

Oral Presentations

Your posters were assigned a number (see poster list), please mount your poster on the board with the respective number and be there during the respective session (even or odd numbers).

ARRIVAL TO THE VENUE

By train:

Take the commuter train S6 from the Munich central station (sublevel) to the final stop, Tutzing. Alternatively, take one of the faster regional trains (RB6 or RB65) from Munich Central Station towards Garmisch-Partenkirchen or Kochel, and get off in Tutzing. It's a 10-minute walk from the train station to the Akademie.

By car:

From Munich get on the Autobahn A95 towards Garmisch-Partenkirchen and take the exit to Starnberg. In Starnberg, follow the Bundesstraße B2 through Starnberg until Traubing. There, turn left following the signs to Tutzing. Parking spaces at the Akademie are limited. We therefore recommend to use public transport.

In Tutzing, there are several Taxi companies, i.e. Taxi Adler 08158/8656, Taxi Eckerl 0172/8757484, Taxi Troche 08158/8556 or Taxi Zanker 08158/7339.

Please mind that, in Germany, taxis are quite expensive.

The *Akademie* was founded in 1947. It is hosted in the castle of Tutzing, which was first built in 1696. The castle was rebuilt and augmented over time, resulting in a mixture of different architectural styles. It opens onto an English garden in the style of the 19th century. Our organization team will be by the Help Desk during registration hours and during the breaks. We will be wearing a yellow color badge, so if you cannot find us at the Help Desk, please just reach out to any of us and we will try to help you with any issues, questions or concerns.

Conferences can be overwhelming, so don't hesitate to seek out quiet areas such as the various patios in the venue to relax and recharge. The venue is situated right by the beautiful Lake Starnberg, which offers wonderful views on the Bavarian Alps.

The castle bar offers various drinks, however note that they only accept cash payments. There are several ATMs in Tutzing for cash withdrawal (see also our <u>map</u> with recommendations).

WHAT TO DO IN/AROUND TUTZING

We have prepared a map with the most relevant locations for our conference, including the location of the venue, train and bus stops, the closest pharmacy, and some ATMs. We have also included recommendations regarding supermarkets, bakeries, dining and drinking locales, etc. You can follow this <u>link</u>, or scan the QR code at the bottom of the map to open the prepared GoogleMaps map with the specific addresses. There are obviously more places and things to discover in Tutzing, so we also encourage you to have fun exploring!



Recommendations for hikes / highlights:



Walk to the Deixelfurther See and Ilkahöhe (~3 hours)

Total length: ~11 km

The Ilkahöhe is a 726 m high hill at the western shore of Starnberger See in the south of Tutzing. It was formed in the ice age by the glacier Würm and is the remnant of a moraine. Because of its exposed location Ilkahöhe is a popular lookout. On clear days you can see the Alps from the highest German mountain Zugspitze to Chiemgauer Alps.



Hike up the Jochberg peak (~ 3 hours)

Elevation gain: ~ 700m Total length: ~ 5 km

Good shoes required (it's still winter)

From Tutzing take the Regional train to Kochel, then the bus 9806 to Kesselberg Paßhöhe. GPS track here: https://www.outdooractive.com/en/route/hiking-trail/toelzer-land/jochberg-super-moon-hike/ 108735943/

Located at the edge of the Bavarian Alps, the Jochberg features an impressive view on the valley on one side, and the central Alps on the other. You will admire the beautiful Kochelsee and Walchensee. For the lazier ones, the same bus 9806 from Kochel also stops at the Herzogstand cable car, which you can take to reach the 1800m high Herzogstand peak: https://www.herzogstandbahn.de/

EXCURSION TO MPI SEEWIESEN

After the closing ceremony on Friday, there will be the opportunity for a 2-hour excursion to the Max Planck Institute for Biological Intelligence in Seewiesen. You will get a tour through the institute including some stories about its history as the former Max Planck Institutes for Behavioural Physiology and Ornithology and a small insight in what research is being conducted currently. As there are limited seats in our buses, please indicate during registration if you would like to participate.

The registration for the excursion is a two-step process:

- **1. Transportation**: If you need transportation, please sign up for a spot in the official shuttle service or in the self-organised car pooling. If you use your own vehicle, please consider to offer available seats in the self organised car pooling.
- **2. Tour:** due to the limited number of participants you **also need** to sign up for one of the three tours, regardless of your means of transportation.
